

first signs of fall, a hint of color, shorter days and long late afternoon shadows as we watch the seasonal shift. The bright yellow of school buses mark that school is in session. We are surrounded by nature and an agricultural bounty- a visit to the Farmers Market is a treasure trove of locally grown produce and a meet up with familiar faces. It's the cadence of our lives. It is of course apple season! For a short window we host thousands who come to enjoy what we love year-round.

We've had many projects this summer, some completed and others ongoing. These include street paving and drainage improvements on Belmar, repaving of Railroad Avenue, Homestead Village Drive and Hawthorn Ave to Gordon. In our parks the Skatepark and Pump Track are nearing completion and we've begun the preliminary work on the Patriots Path in Veteran's Memorial Park. A Town wide traffic safety study which includes the three Villages has begun as part of Safe Streets for All Grantthis will include demonstration projects in the Village as part of the 'Slow Down Warwick

campaign. Well Number Three, a critical part of our water infrastructure has been upgraded and will be back online this Fall and we are amid building a new water pump station on Grand Street replacing the Maple Ave Pump Station. We continue with the Wastewater Treatment Plant upgrade, a multi-phase, multiyear project. Internally we have been working towards digitizing Village files a herculean task. As part of our commitment to Climate Smart Communities we are doing a solar array at our Public Works Facility.

Most of the projects have been funded through State or Federal resources and were made possible through State Senator James Skoufis and Congressman Pat Ryan. Fall is also a season of events and activities in the Village. Ladies Night Out, Applefest, Taste of Warwick are all sponsored by the Merchant's Collective and the Warwick Chamber of Commerce. The Annual Wine and Cheese, The Reincarnation Ball, Haunted History Tours, Special Lectures and a Veteran's Day Eve event are all sponsored by The Warwick Historical Society. The Veterans of Foreign War Post 4662.

Fall is also the season of fanfare and Wildcat's football! Be ready for the annual Homecoming Parade and festivities!

So, Fall in all its splendor in the Warwick Valley awaits. Enjoy!

2025 SUMMER REC PROGRAM SUMMARY

The 2025 Village of Warwick Recreation Programs had another successful summer. 936 children were enrolled throughout the 8 programs. Most of the programs reached near maximum enrollment. The Village of Warwick hired 63 employees that assisted in running all of the programs. The Village of Warwick switched to a new registration program this year which made the registration process easier than ever.

The Stanley-Deming Park Program had a very busy summer. This was the second summer that children registered weekly to get more children enrolled. We did not have any children on the waitlist this summer. A wide variety of arts and crafts were made throughout the summer. One of the most creative crafts made was a butterfly magnet then the kids went on a tour of the pollination exhibit at the park looking for butterflies. Tie-dyeing shirts was the big hit for arts and crafts this summer. The following tournaments took place at the Park Program: soccer, basketball, dodgeball, home run derby, spike ball and touch football. The park program finished up the last day with our

annual talent show. The winners of the tournaments/contests received recreation champion t-shirts.

All of the sport specific programs (tennis, football, soccer, lacrosse, track, cheerleading and basketball) were very successful in teaching children basic skills of the sport, rules of the game and game participation. Olympic Week at the track program was a huge hit. Every child received a track ribbon and many medals were handed out to the winners of the various events that took place during the week.

As the summer is coming to an end the Village of Warwick Recreation Department would like to thank the Village of Warwick, Town of Warwick and the Orange County Youth Bureau for their supporting funds for our programs.

The Village of Warwick will begin leaf pickup on November 1. Leaves must be placed at the curb in paper bags. The final pickup will take place during the week of December 8.Residents may also bring bagged leaves to the Village Brush Pile at the Department of Public Works site in Veterans Memorial Park. The Brush Pile is open every Saturday and Sunday in October and November, from 12–4p.m. Please do not dump leaves in the street, as they can clog storm



drains and cause flooding.

Exciting progress is underway in our community! Thanks to the Kasuga Foundation and Warwick Skate Park Initiative, long-anticipated skate park is on track for completion next to the Library this October, and we can't wait to see it buzzing with activity. Alongside it, the pump track is now complete thanks in large part to the Village of Warwick DPW, dedication of volunteers and the generous support of the Lion's Club. We'll be celebrating with a ribbon cutting this Fall, and everyone is invited to join the festivities.

For those who love the water, new kayak launches are being installed thanks to a grant from the Town, making it easier than ever to enjoy our creeks and lakes. These additions expand recreation opportunities for families, paddlers, and nature enthusiasts alike.
