LEAD SERVICE LINE UPDATE: NOVEMBER 2024

The Village with its consultant completed the first step in the Lead Service Line Inventory which involved creating the customer database, reviewing Village records and performing customer outreach. Service lines were categorized by type of material (lead, galvanized requiring replacement or non-lead) or listed as unknown. Letters were mailed to customers in early November whose service line material was galvanized or unknown. To date there have been no lead service lines found in the Village's system


In mid-November the consultant began performing confirmatory investigations to determine the material of the unknown service lines. One confirmatory method being used involves a hydro-vac machine, making a small excavation around the water curb stop at the front of the customers property and visually inspecting the service line to determine the service line material.

The second type of confirmatory investigation uses Electro-Scan which the consultant will use at about 370 locations. This process involves entering a customer's premises to access the water meter which will be temporarily removed to gain access to

the service line. The small device is inserted in the service line and extended in the line toward the street to determine the material of the line. Once withdrawn the meter is replaced and water service will be restored.

The ongoing investigations will allow the Village to reduce the number of unknown lines. Customers will be notified as their information is updated. It is important to note that starting in 1986 plumbing was not allowed to contain lead. Many of our cus-

tomers whose houses were built after 1986 are currently listed as "unknown" and are expected to be confirmed as non-lead material during the current investigations.

DROUGHT ALERT

VOLUNTARY WATER RESTRICTIONS
The Village of Warwick is currently under
a drought watch. Residents are strongly
encouraged to conserve water. Here are
ways you can conserve water on a daily
basis both indoors and out:

INDOORS

- Store drinking water from your faucet in your fridge so you don't have to run the tap while it cools.
- Use washing machines for full loads only.
- Run the dishwasher only when full.
- When washing dishes by hand, don't let the water run. Fill one basin with wash water and the other with rinse water.
- Install an aerator on your kitchen faucet to reduce flow to less than 1 gallon per minute.
- Use the garbage disposal sparingly. Alternatively, you can compost vegetable food waste and save gallons of water every time.
- Install low-flow shower heads.
- Take a five-minute shower instead of a ten-minute one.
- Turn your bathroom faucet off when brushing your teeth or shaving.

OUTDOORS

- Limit all outdoor watering.
- Put a layer of mulch around trees and plants to reduce evaporation and keep the soil cool.
- Landscape your yard with climateappropriate plants.
- Use a broom instead of a hose to clean driveways, sidewalks, and patios.
- Reuse water for your plants. Reuse opportunities include cooled-down cooking water or collecting the unused water used when running the tap while waiting for cold or hot water.

Water conservation begins at home and benefits the entire community.

PLATE AND GRAZE CATERING


Plate and Graze Catering is owned by two lifetime Warwick residents, Adrienne and Randy Foust Jr., both Warwick High School graduates.

CHRISTMAS TREE PICK UP

The Village of Warwick Department of Public Works will pick up Christmas trees shortly after December 25 and into the new year. Please check the village website for dates. Trees must be placed by the curb.

SKATING RINK

Skating rink will be open in Veterans Memorial Park as weather permits.

Please remember that moving snow from driveways, sidewalks and cars into village streets are prohibited.

VILLAGE SIDEWALKS

Warwick's Village code (and that of most municipalities) requires that property owners build, repair, and maintain adjacent sidewalks. This includes snow and ice removal during the Winter months within 24 hours of snowfall. *Blowing leaves and snow into the street is prohibited.*

§ 117-24

[Amended 3-9-1987 by L.L. No. 3-1987]

B. Any property owner who fails to remove snow and/or ice from sidewalks adjoining his property within 24 hours after a snowfall and any person who throws, shovels, plows or places snow or ice onto a public street, highway or right-of-way shall be guilty of a violation and subject to a fine not exceeding \$250 or by imprisonment for a term not exceeding 15 days, or by both said fine and imprisonment.
